

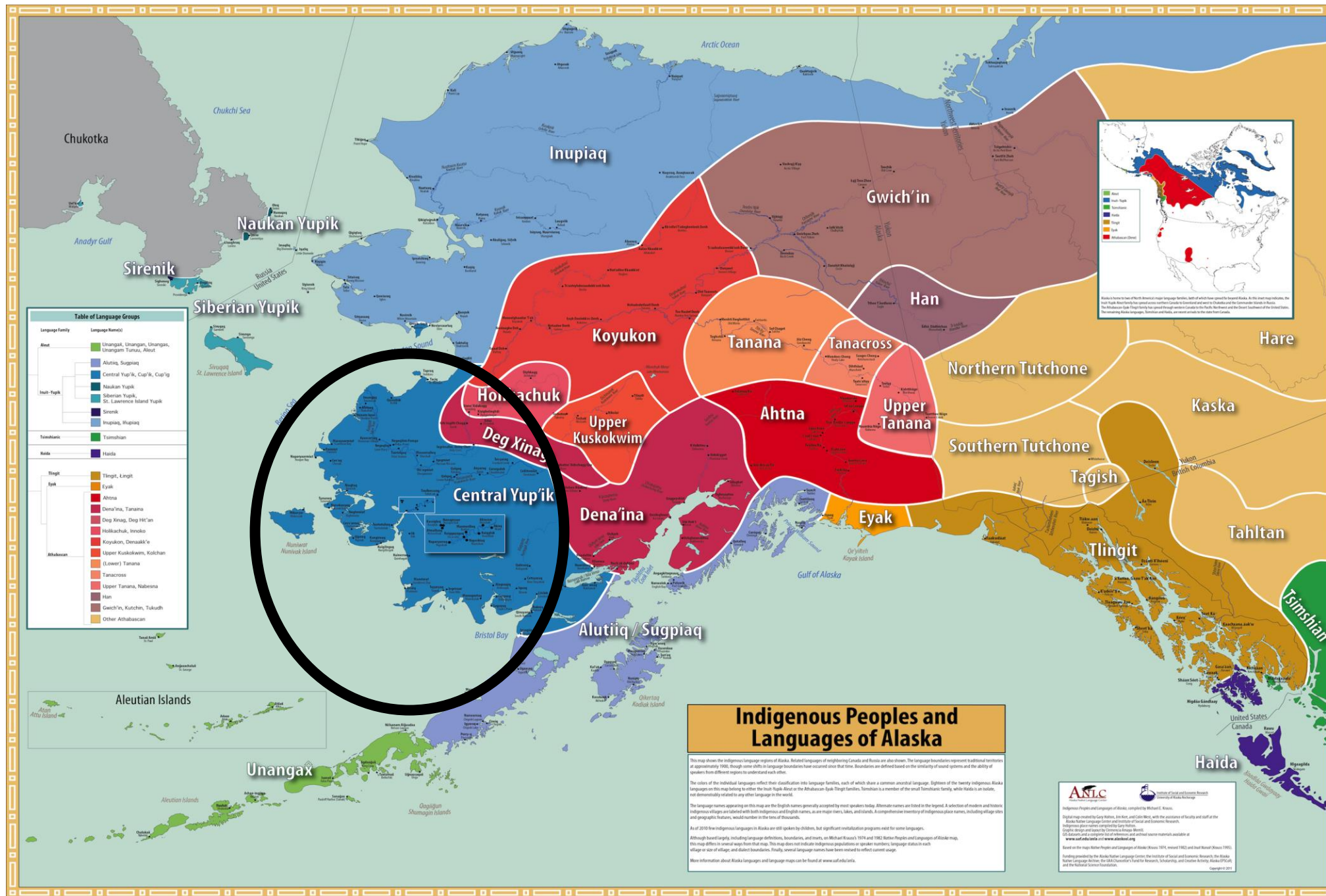

Yupik relied on marine animal, such as Seals, Walrus, Fish, and they sometimes harpooned Wales. Yupik also found berries and author plants that they ate.

Yupik art is carved into wood or ivory. Yupik art comes in all different shapes, like animals, or pieces of an animal bodies for an example a walrus tusk



Parkas are extremely warm coats. They are made of reindeer, squirrel, muskrat, bird, fish, seal, and rabbit. To make the skins soft you must tan them then let them dry.



Yupik gloves are made of thick caribou hide, rabbit, and seal. These gloves help a lot for Yupik.



Mukluks are made of reindeer, caribou, and seal skin. Mukluks are warm.
